## Grade 8 Parent Information Night



## Grade 9 Geography: RU a Planner?

In celebration of World Town Planning Day in November, Bethune's grade 9 Geography students participated in *RU a Planner?* workshops, a joint initiative between Ryerson's Urban Planning students and the City of Toronto Planning Department. The goal of *RU a Planner?* is to empower students to realize their capacity to change the cities in which they live. Students participated in an interactive presentation on the elements that make a living in a city enjoyable. Students explored topics such

as walkability, heritage projection, building at a human scale, the tree canopy, and transit infrastructure. Students worked on local case studies which kick-started their thinking on how to plan for the future, excellent urban design, and how we make our city beautiful. ## Next Generation

**DAY 1** - At first, we didn't know what to expect from the Next Generation Conference. Everyone sat in the audience eagerly waiting for something to happen, until the singing began. The First Nation woman's prayer song filled the commons with her powerful yet beautiful voice. It felt like we had been teleported into a place of peace and serenity. Some of us felt a heart-warming and chilling feeling as if the song was speaking to us. After the song, she went on to talk about how First Nations people are still being mistreated today. She mentioned how people are misconceived about First Nations people and their culture.

After the workshops ended, we all gathered in the commons and watched a short student-made documentary that talked about Syrian refugees. The conference leaders highlighted what each group had done during the day. By the end of the day, we all learned something new about current world issues. We looked forward to the next conference.

**DAY 2** - Day two of the conference started off very strong. After a brief recap of what we did last conference day, we were given an overview of what was going to happen throughout the day.

The facilitators placed blankets around the room, and asked everyone to stand on a blanket close to them. Roles were assigned to us based on the cards they gave us before the activity began, for example some of us were children sitting in the middle surrounded by adults of the community. Each blanket represented an Indigenous people's community. The activity was designed to show the story of what has happened to the Indigenous communities in Canada over the last 500 years. As the activity progressed, communities started to diminish over time. People were called to leave their blankets when certain events occurred, for example some children were forced to leave because of residential schools. By the end of the activity most of the blankets were either empty or close to empty, meaning that most Indigenous communities have been destroyed. This activity conveyed a powerful message and it taught us the hardships that Indigenous people had to endure.

**DAY 3** - Day three started off with the facilitators giving a brief review of what was done last conference day. We were

then showed videos of some social action campaigns. An example of a campaign was a commercial that showed how young women are being negatively influenced by "ideal body types," that are portrayed in the media. They wanted to show us how we can use positive media to counter the negative type of media being put out. The topic of the day was then presented to us, and it was about understanding, and sharing our history. Before we were given the opportunity to learn about the unspoken Canadian history, we got to share the histories of our parents, and grandparents. Some of us had the opportunity to learn about history that was never spoken of in our Canadian history classes. One of the events that they highlighted was the Komagata Maru incident in 1914. The incident involved the refusal to allow refugees from Punjab, and British India into Canada. The passengers were held in their ship for two months, and were not given any food. Eventually the ship was forced to leave, and go back to India where upon arrival, 19 people were killed. Many of us were shocked to learn of the details of the actions the government took to try and make Canada an "all white society." Overall, everyone went through a very eye opening experience.

**DAY 4** - The fourth day began with a Tobacco Ceremony that was meant to welcome in spirits that would help guide us throughout the day. After the ceremony, we watched two short student-made documentaries which summarized the events of the first few conference days. In our core workshops, we shared our "I Am" poems within small groups. We participated in an activity where we had to choose between four corners of a room and decide if different stereotypical statements are either: not harmful, somewhat harmful, harmful or very harmful. We focused on the many types of discrimination that are present in today's society, such as ableism, sexism, racism, and heterosexism. In the afternoon, we took part in our elective workshops that described discrimination towards cultural and social groups. In our workshops, we brainstormed ways to support our groups through allyship. We are looking forward to the youth summit on December 18.
